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Message from an Ursuline Sister

Dear Parents/Carers

My name is Sister Alice, and I am an Ursuline sister and have been based in Warsaw in Poland in an Ursuline convent.

I am very familiar with St. Ursula's school and with Ursuline's education. As a school with an Ursuline tradition, your daughters will become familiar with two saints: St. Ursula, the patron of the school and of Ursuline sisters worldwide, and St. Angela, who began the Ursulines in northern Italy in 1535.

Although St. Angela did not found any schools, her writings and ideas formed the bedrock of an educational tradition that now operates in schools all over the world. So, you now belong to something truly international.

St. Angela wrote about the need to love and support each other, to treat each other with respect and for those in charge of younger sisters, to encourage them, support them, and try to understand them. These ideas we have successfully taken into our education of young people in Ursuline schools.

St Ursula probably lived in the fourth century and died for her faith. Jesus was at the centre of her life. She became an inspiration for St. Angela for whom Jesus was also the centre of her life.

Your new school badge, the Serviam badge, has a simple Christian cross in the centre, to remind us that Jesus should also be at the centre of our lives and our school. That badge is worn by students all over the world.

So, your school motto is now 'Serviam' or 'I will serve' and you will learn more about this in your journey through school.

St. Angela often used the Italian word 'Insieme' which means 'together'. Her point was that in supporting each other we will not only find ourselves, but the God who created us and loves us. It's a beautiful idea.

My prayer for you is that God will bless your journey through St. Ursula's; that your teachers will inspire you and that you will make good friends. Friends are a very special gift from God. May you also be happy and fulfilled.

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Ethos and Values

The School Day

Uniform in St Ursula's

Our uniform is an integral part of the day-to-day culture of St Ursula's, and we expect it to be worn with pride by all students. The uniform acts and both a unifying element and a point of recognition, whilst removing from parents and carers the financial burden of providing non-uniform clothes.

The following items must be worn:

- **Navy school blazer :** This must have the embossed school logo on it and must be worn at all times, unless the Headteacher permits otherwise e.g. during hot weather.
- Navy pleated school skirt or school trousers : The skirt is a distinctive school style, and no other variant is acceptable during the five years students are in St Ursula's. The skirt must be below the knee and above the ankle. Trousers must be plain navy St Ursula's uniform tailored trousers. No jeans, skinny fit trousers or leggings are permitted.
- Red plain V-necked jumper with designated coloured stripe : This should be worn every day.

YR11 –Gold / YR10 – Lilac / YR9 – Blue / YR8 – Red / YR7 Green

- **Blouse :** White revered collar blouse. Jumpers and t-shirs should not be worn under the blouse. The school blouse must be tucked into the skirt or trousers, and is not to be regarded as an overblouse.
- Navy blue or black tights or knee high socks : Socks must be worn to the knee.
- **Black shoes :** Shoes should support the whole foot. Shoes which do not firmly grip the upper part of the foot are not suitable. Boots or ankle boots must not be worn, including Kicker boots. The heel should be flat, no higher than 3cm. Shoes must be plain black. Embellishments such as bows are not allowed, and toes should not be pointed. Black trainers, sling back shoes, ankle strap shoes, fabric or sandal type shoes or sliders are not acceptable.
- Plain navy or black coat : This should be worn in cold or wet weather. No logos should be visible. Denim / leather jackets, track suit tops, fleeces / hoodies, body warmers / gilets are not allowed.
- Winter gloves and scarves : These should be plain black or navy blue without any logos.
- School bag : This must be black or navy, strong and made of sturdy material. The bag must be free-standing, closed at the top and capable of holding books 40cm x 30cm. Shaped rucksacks in black or navy are acceptable but should not carry the makers branding logo. Handbags are not acceptable schoolbags.
- Hats : These are not permitted in school unless advised by the Headteacher with regards to adverse weather or school trips.

PE Kit

- St Ursula's joggers
- St Ursula's PE leggings
- St Ursula's PE jumper
- St Ursula's polo shirt
- St Ursula's socks navy blue that cover the ankle
- A pair of predominantly white, navy or black sports trainers. Leisure shoes, canvas shoes and plimsoles are not allowed.

Students may wear a watch, a small crucifix under the blouse and one small set of plain gold or silver studs in the lower ear lobe; Nose studs or any other form of body piercings are forbidden. Retainers for piercings are not permitted. No other jewellery is allowed.

All make-up, including make-up accessories, are banned. Nail varnish and false / acrylic nails are banned. Nail extensions represent a Health and Safety risk in a number of practical lessons and are not allowed. False eyelashes / eyelash extensions are not permitted.

Hairbands / headbands / hair clips must be navy blue or black. Hair embellishments and beads are not permitted.

Hairstyles and hair colour including braids should be a natural hair colouring. Extreme hair colouring e.g. bright red, pink, blue etc. is not allowed Dip dying and half hair dying is not permitted. Hair should not be worn over the face or eyes. Undercuts are not permitted. The definition of extreme lies with the school.

All students are expected to wear the correct uniform and to wear it well. The school uniform is kept as simple and inexpensive as possible. IF there are any special temporary difficulties, please let your child's Pastoral and Wellbeing Lead know.

All items of uniform should be clearly marked with your child's name.


